Introduction to the readings

You will hear that both our OT and NT readings talk of the power of the wind and the waves. The psalm celebrates God's steadfast love shown as the redeemer and rescuer of His people. We are only hearing part of the psalm today but one phrase is repeated throughout the whole psalm 'they cried to the Lord in their trouble and God rescued them.' The disciples too cried to Jesus in their trouble as a violent storm hit Lake Galilee.

Mark 4:35-41

Reader 2 Emily

On that day, when evening had come, Jesus said to them, 'Let us go across to the other side.' And leaving the crowd behind, they took him with them in the

boat, just as he was. Other boats were with him. A great gale arose, and the waves beat into the boat, so that the boat was already swamped. But he was in the stern, asleep on a cushion; and they woke him and said, 'Teacher, do you not care that we are perishing?' He woke up and rebuked the wind and said to the sea, 'Peace. Be still!' Then the wind ceased and there was a dead calm. He said to them, 'Why are you afraid? Have you still no faith?' And they were filled with great awe and said to one another, 'Who is this, that even the wind and the sea obey him?'

Reflection 'Lord do you not care?' Hearing God in the storms of life

I am not a good sailor - I freely admit that. I think I may have shared with some of you before, the story of a boat trip that I was part of in New Zealand. We had been promised a gentle ride round an estuary but once we were on the boat, the owners decided it would be much more exciting to take us to see an albatross. These birds were not always near the coast and sometimes you have to travel out many miles in open water to catch a glimpse of one. Most people on the small boat were excited [and it was a small boat]. For them, this was an added bonus. But not for me and as we ventured out to sea, the waves swelled and our boat went up and down and we got further and further away from the coastline. I got to the point when I couldn't have cared if I saw an albatross or not [and I knew this was really a great privilege]. I wanted to shout to the boat owners 'Don't you care that we are tossing up and down, that I feel sick and afraid.' I didn't trust them. So I can empathise so much with the disciples in this event that we have heard recorded in Mark's gospel.

Here were men who were seasoned fishermen and yet they were afraid. It must have been a tremendous storm. The Sea of Galilee is surrounded by hills, except for a valley dip at one end, which can act like a funnel for the wind. And this means that the water can go from being still and calm to choppy with white horse waves as the wind whips up the water. These men would have experienced conditions like this before so this must have been a particularly violent storm. And what seemed to aggravate the fishermen more was that Jesus just slept through it all, his head on a cushion. And the cry is not asking him to do something, they question whether he cares. 'Teacher do you not care that we are perishing?' It is a cry from the heart, a rebuke from friends who feel abandoned. [Similar to the way that I wanted to cry to the boat owners in New Zealand because of their lack of sensitivity] I wonder what the

disciples expected Jesus to do - lend a hand in bailing out the boat. Instead Jesus changes the fury of this space of inland water simply by saying 'Peace be still!'

But the encounter doesn't end there — Jesus challenges the disciples about their lack of faith, their lack of understand of who he really is. For we have to remember that this incident comes towards the beginning of Christ's ministry. The disciples are still trying to work out who Jesus is — a good teacher, a prophet, a miracle worker, the Messiah? The sketchy picture that they have is becoming clearer. And none more so after this incident — in the end the miracle itself affects the disciples more than the storm does. In Jewish scripture the sea often symbolises the dark power of evil. Now Jesus has not only calmed the storm, he has power over the forces of nature, evil over good.

'Lord do you not care? Hearing God in the storms of life' is the theme of this morning's service . You may have felt when you read this - how inappropriate for a church anniversary. Usually it is one of rejoicing and thanksgiving. But as soon as I read the set lectionary reading for today - I felt it was actually most appropriate. 'Lord do you not care?' was the question the disciples asked in the midst of the storm. It is, if we are honest, a question that you and I have asked sometime and in different circumstances over these past fifteen months. Do you not care about my family circumstances, about the loss of life, jobs, well being, we have suffered, about the fear and anxiety this pandemic has caused? About the separation of family and friends, about the inability to worship and be community together? And not just about ourselves, about the disruption to community life, the toll and strain on our health and social services. And in the wider world the even greater impact when community structures and provision is not as strong, Lord do you not care? Are you not listening? Has it felt during this difficult and challenging time as though God himself is asleep on a pillow?

Jesus' response to the disciples can seem harsh; he challenges them to have more faith. Jesus challenges us to hold onto our belief in a God of love who loved us so much that he sent his only Son to live among us and die for our sins, our uncertainties so that above all the storms of life, we can cling onto the knowledge that God is with us. Through all the traumas, the challenges, so that ultimately whatever happens we can have everlasting life in Him. Faith is sometimes looked on as an accepting thing. Someone with great faith is pictured as a person who accepts with calmness even politeness whatever

happens to them. But if we have faith we have the right to question, to be angry, to cry out [we see this so often in the psalms which are full of emotion]. And it is so often through those times of questioning both individually and as a church that we move forward, that we grow in our faith. We, in our church communities, have to allow people to share their pain and not be silent, we need to take each other's suffering, whatever that maybe, seriously and together in prayerful empathy move forward with a deeper faith in God and a greater understanding and love for one another. The sadness over these past few months has been that it has been harder to come together to do this but please never underestimate the value of a phone call, a conversation and most of all prayer.

For God is with us in the midst of the storm his voice says 'Peace be still' The challenges may still be with us and the sadness and frustrations too but God is, so to speak, in the boat with us. Knowing his presence should itself bring us inner peace. But we have to play our part too. As we have done over the years at this church, we will still experience challenges [these will not end] but we can also experience that great sense of community. As we continue to weather the storm of the COVID pandemic, we need to prayer for each other, be kind to each other, listen to each other and build each other up even if we have to do this virtually or by zoom or other means.

The Latin word for ship is 'navis'. If you imagine the body of a medieval —style church turned upside down, you have a 'boat' and the body of such a church is technically the nave. Wherever and whatever the church is at which you worship, imagine a large space within in, a boat shape and then imagine all your church community in the boat together. We may be all different but in such circumstances, through thick and thin, we have to pull together, be of one mind in Christ. At times, some will need help from others, some will take the lead, and some will get down to the grind of making sure the boat is ship shape. But what we will all need to do, as we travel together, is worship. Worship the one whom the winds and the waves obey. Put our trust and our hope in Him and He will never fail us. 'I am with you, peace be still'. And that is why we can celebrate and we can rejoice on this special day.

Prayer of Confession

God of our questions and our struggles, when we too quickly mistake silence for indifference:

Forgive us and help us.

When the voice of our own needs silences the voice of others:

Forgive us and help us.

When we abandon others in their storm and watch safely from the shore:

Forgive us and help us

When we lose faith because things get tough

Forgive us and help us.

We know you forgive us, you save us, you encourage, challenge and calm us and for this we are thankful, Faithful one so unchanging.
